The London area is home to six airports, but the two most commonly used by travelers are Heathrow (LHR) and Gatwick (LGW). Located 24 km from central London, Heathrow is the closest large airport to downtown, and is also the most well-connected, served by both underground metro (the Tube), and express train.
